Equipment

Each participant should at least have one object that they are willing to show others.

The chat or a whiteboard can be useful to write down new vocabulary after the game.





Technicalities

Participants need a camera.

erpanes need a camera.

The teamer asks the participants to grab an object close to them. It can be any type of object, for example a cup.

Once everybody has an object they let the teamer know (for example by showing their thumb). They shouldn't show their object yet, to keep the surprise for later.

Once everyone is ready, the first person (A) shows their object and says its name in their first language. Person A says the name three times. Everybody has to repeat it after each time. For the first and the second repetition, the participants stay on mute. For the third repetition, they can unmute themselves.

Person A then calls the next person (B) and "passes" them their object. Person A repeats the name of their object again. Person B unmutes and repeats the name of Person A's object. Person B then present their own object in their favourite language. The process is repeated until everyone has presented their object.

Don't hesitate to encourage participants to play with the objects, passing them through the screens as if they were sitting next to each other etc.
